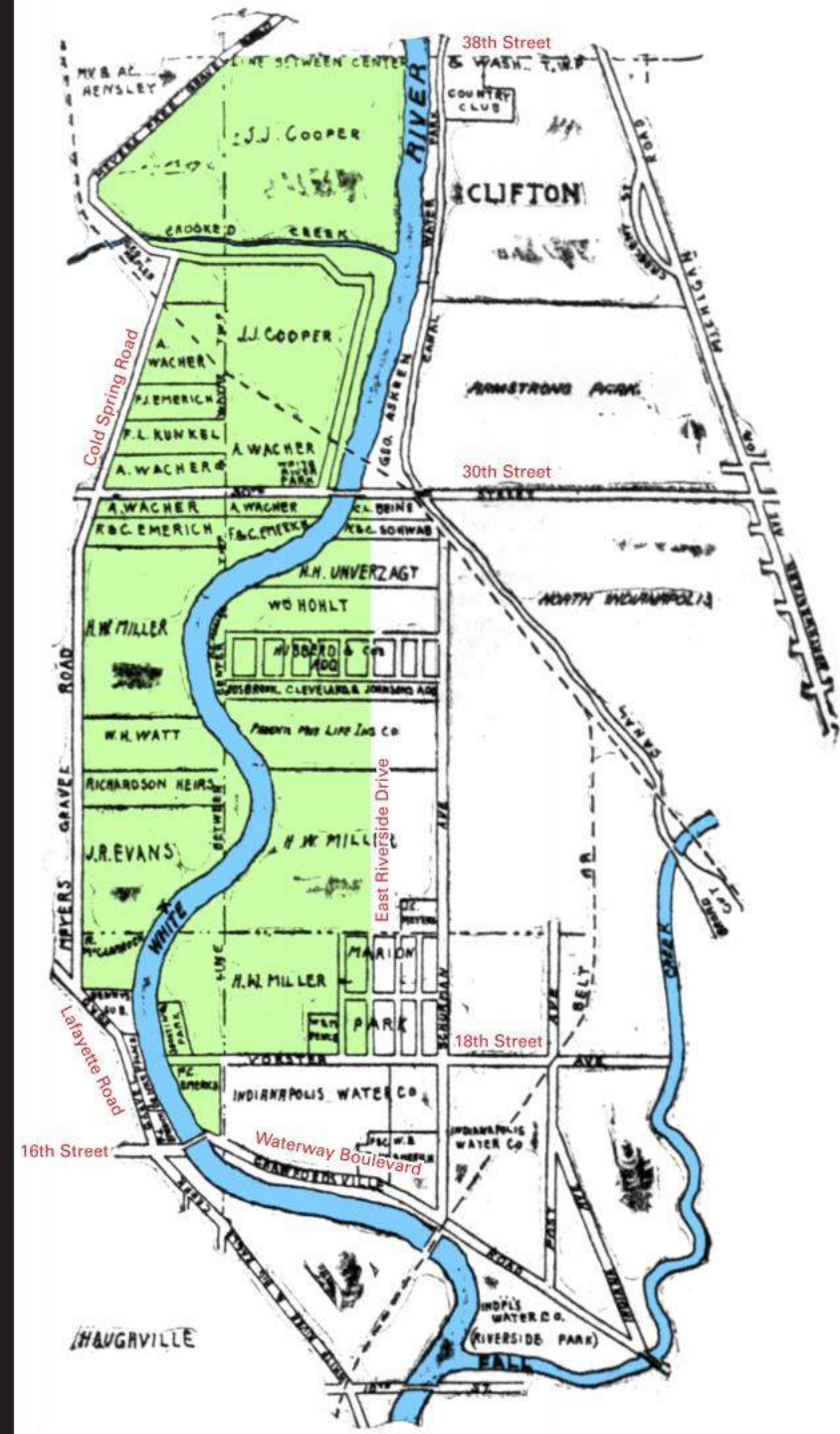

WHITE RIVER IN THE PROSPECTIVE PARK.

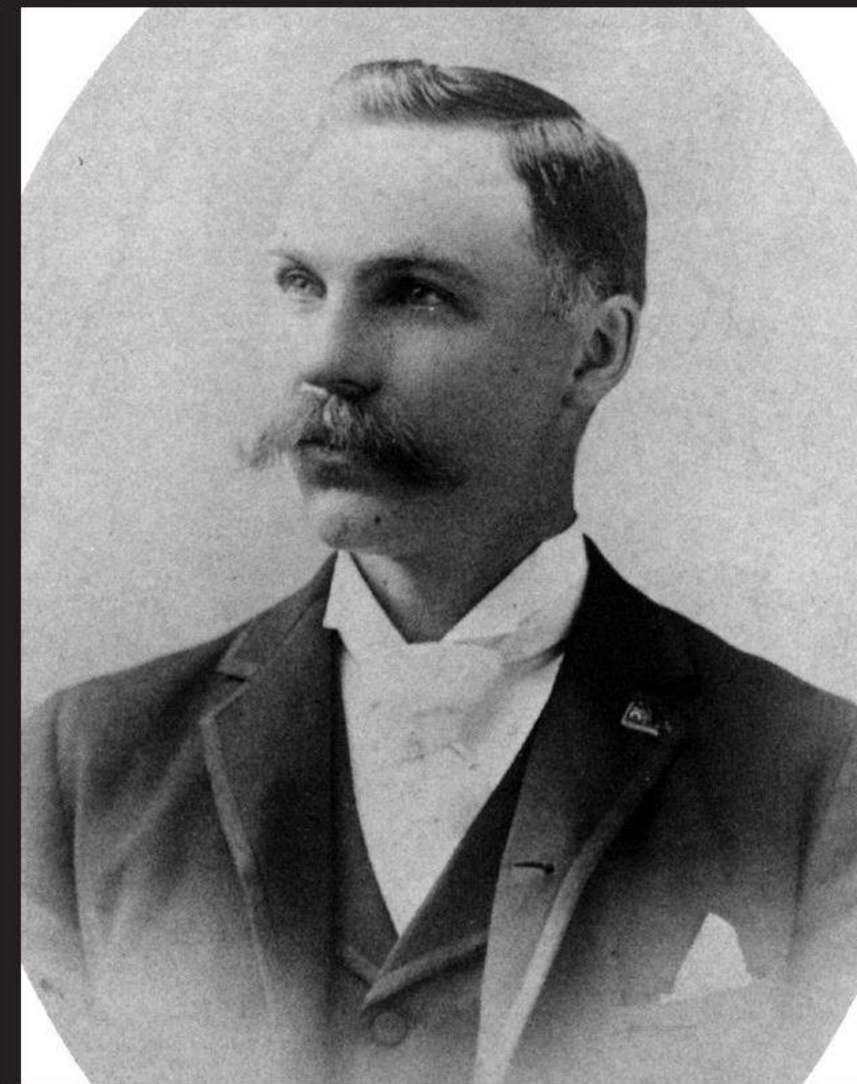

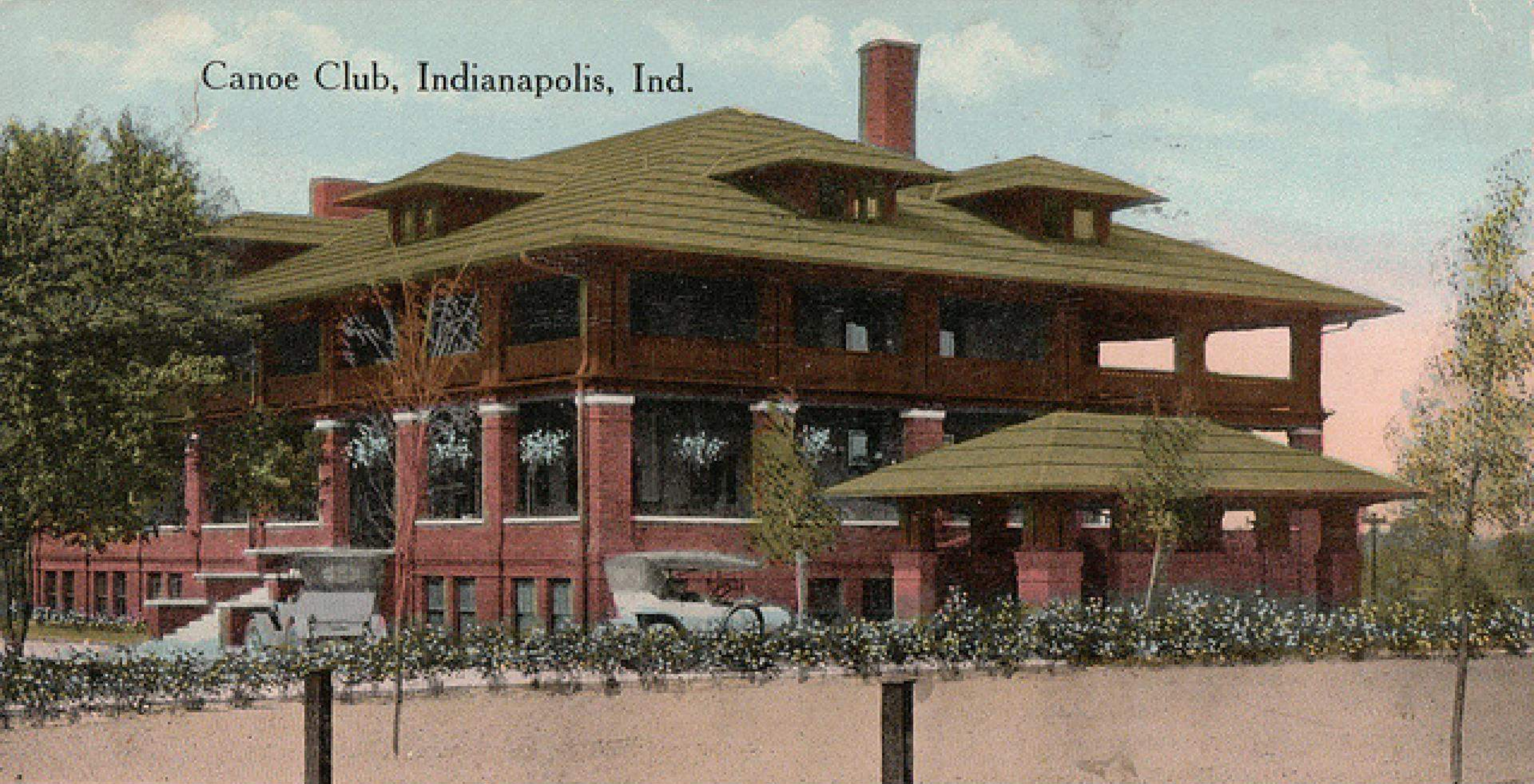


START OF ONE-MILE RACE.

DENY USE OF CITY PARKS

Negroes Are Told To Go To Douglas Park By Park Head, Policy

On Tuesday morning, representatives of The Recorder, visited the office of the Board of Park Commissioners. They sought of the clerk, who waited on them, a permit to hold a picnic in a public park. The clerk proceeded to issue the permit, but when told the permit was wanted for Brookside Park, he balked. He told the Recorder representative that on account of the crowds, the park was not available for this particular date. He was then asked if the park was available for the previous day. He then informed the Recorder representative it was not available. The clerk was asked if it was available at any time and, when he could not answer the question, he ushered the Recorder representatives into the office of the Superintendent of Parks.

one thousand nine hundred and sixty-four*

An Act

To enforce the constitutional right to vote, to confer jurisdiction upon the district courts of the United States to provide injunctive relief against discrimination in public accommodations, to authorize the Attorney General to institute suits to protect constitutional rights in public facilities and public education, to extend the Commission on Civil Rights, to prevent discrimination in federally assisted programs, to establish a Commission on Equal Employment Opportunity, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That this Act may be cited as the "Civil Rights Act of 1964".
