





### Floodplain Regulations

- National Flood Insurance Program
   (NFIP) is Administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)
- Reduces flood damages by:
  - Identifying flood risks (FIRMs)
  - Encouraging sound floodplain management
  - Providing subsidized flood insurance
- City of Indianapolis participates in the NFIP and is responsible for enforcing sound floodplain management










### Floodplain Regulations

**High Risk – Special Flood Hazard Area** 


(100yr: Zone A, Zone AE, etc.)

### What is a levee?

- A barrier constructed along a stream bank to provide a specific level of protection to an area from flooding.
- A structure that requires regular maintenance.
- A structure with an inherent risk of failure during large floods.







- Levees need to maintain current level of protection







The house in Garfield Park is of stone

On Tuesday morning, representatives of The Recorder, visited the office of the Board of Park Commissioners. They sought of the clerk, who waited on them, a permit to hold a picnic in a public park.
